German Language Instruction Methodology:

In order to create an authentic-like atmosphere, the communicative method will be the point of departure and fundamental basis for all topics, language structures and cultures explored. *Therefore, German 101 will be conducted almost exclusively in German.* There will, of course, be room to use English periodically to explain logistical matters and topics needing particular attention such as absences, grades, and syllabus questions, etc. Such concerns should be addressed <u>during office hours</u>. Ultimately, students are expected to participate actively in class activities and take personal ownership of their journey as language learners.

Course Description:

A beginning language course focusing on the study of the language and culture of German speaking-countries. Students begin to develop the ability to communicate in German through the consideration of cultural themes, language functions, and authentic situations as they acquire the structures and lexicon to work with written language, conversation, and composition. No prior knowledge of German is required. In-class work is supplemented by 20 hours of online homework.

Course Outcomes:

Upon course completion, a student will be able to:

 Communicate in the target language at an elementary level in the skill areas of reading, writing, speaking and listening.



- Apply linguistic structures supporting communication at the elementary level of proficiency.
- Express and appropriately employ the following language functions: greetings, leavetakings, requesting information, asking for assistance, giving and receiving directions, and expressing opinions.
- Discuss the cultures of German-speaking countries and societies and specific cultural practices at the elementary level by using simple sentences.
- Discuss the relationship between the cultural practices and products under consideration at the elementary level by using simple sentences.
- Exhibit appropriate sociolinguistic behaviors through oral presentations at the elementary level as these correspond to increasing linguistic ability in German.
- Produce and present a cultural project at the elementary level.

Tests and Quizzes: You will have 1 test written test, two graded oral exams, and 2 quizzes during the semester. Please note that unannounced quizzes and assessments may be given at the discretion of the instructor. These tests will consist of the following sections: listening comprehension, vocabulary, grammar, reading, culture and writing. The specific dates of the tests and quizzes are stated in the syllabus. The student must have instructor approval to arrange make-ups (see policy below).

- Missed Exams/Tests/Quizzes and Make-Up Exams/Tests/Quizzes Policy:
 - An absence on the day or time of a quiz and/or exam/test results in a 0 for that assignment. If an extenuating circumstance prevents you from communicating with the instructor prior to an examination, you are expected to address this in an email to the instructor as soon as possible. Should a make-up exam/quiz be scheduled, the instructor may change the structure of the assignment in format and/or level of difficulty (e.g. oral exam, mixture, etc.)

During an exam or quiz please refrain from any type of communication with peers so as to avoid a zero for that assignment. Finally, there will be announced and unannounced assessments to check overall language proficiency; these will be incorporated into your overall participation score.
- *Late Assignment Policy:*

Class work is accepted only on or before the due dates listed on the course syllabus and/or as indicated by the instructor. If you cannot attend a class session, make arrangements to have your work turned in on time or inform yourself (through a classmate) of the topics covered during your absence. No late work will be accepted for credit. Assignments to be graded or turned in for credit will be indicated in the course syllabus, reminders may not always be given. However, said assignments are still due on the date indicated.

Do not wait until the last minute to complete assignments; allow for ample time to revisit your projects and notes. Utilize the office hours and tutoring sessions available to you, as these are



invaluable opportunities to get help and clarify material. Throughout the semester, changes may be made to the course syllabus or assignments to adjust to the needs of students, teaching objectives or any unforeseen schedule changes (e.g. campus closure to inclement weather). Notice will be provided to students of these changes.

Attendance and Class Participation: Active participation in class contributes to your learning and is an important factor in your grade. The instructor will monitor student participation (see rubric).

Cultural Project: Students will complete a project that deals with an aspect of German culture. The presentation will be 4-5 minutes in length and students will present in German. The topic for the project must be approved by the professor by the date indicated in the syllabus. Topics will require research; students will need to use reliable resources and provide a bibliography of their sources following MLA formatting. Students will present their work through the use of technology, such as PowerPoint or Prezi. No more than one 30 second video clip may be used. Students are responsible for presenting their work to the class on the day indicated in the syllabus. More detailed instructions will be provided by your instructor.

Oral Exams: Students will complete two oral exams (one at midterm and one at the end of the course) requiring them to speak extemporaneously about a given topic. You will receive a list of topics and a rubric for evaluation 2 weeks prior to each oral exam.

Final Exam: A cumulative final exam will be given on the day scheduled during the exam period. The final exam is mandatory and cannot be rescheduled. The time and place for the final exam, 8. Mai, 12:30 pm – 2:30 pm in SB 212, is also indicated in the class schedule and under administrative dates. Please mark it on your calendars now.

German-American Heritage Sites in D.C. and German –American Heritage Museum in D.C.

Museum Course Component: (Field Trip to D.C. and Corresponding Assignments):

This semester, all enrolled students in this section of GER 101 will engage in an in-depth and enriching field trip to the German-American Heritage Museum and various other Germanheritage sites in Washington, D.C. This constitutes an exciting learning opportunity!

The museum and fieldtrip component is <u>mandatory</u>, part of the graded course curriculum, and will also offer an opportunity to deepen your intercultural skills as learners of German. For this cultural experience, we will pursue questions of German culture and history within the scope of a transatlantic relationship while underscoring various aspects of its diversity.

Specifically, we will visit, among other sites, the German-American Heritage Museum and the National Mall in Washington, D.C. Prior to and upon concluding the field trip, you will engage with new cultural content and media, which will provide you with new tools to articulate the



cultural and linguistic objectives of GER 101. One such tool is the Smithsonian Learning Lab: https://learninglab.si.edu/

As part of the required museum visit, you will complete discussion forums and other specific assignments (See the Blackboard "Field Trip" tab for specific assignment instructions).

Consultations/Tutoring:

- 1. Each student is required to actively participate in at least one 30-minute consultation/tutoring session. This can include coaching and/or tutoring about course work, such as the cultural project, and to further deepen your practice of the target language, German!
- Alternatively, students can also actively participate in documented on-campus MC events that are culturally relevant, such as cultural programming, technology workshops designed for learning enhancement—as approved by the instructor.

Option 1: One 30-minute consultation/tutoring sessions with a German faculty member

Option 2: One relevant on campus cultural event/technology workshop

What can you expect from this semester?

Although this is an introductory German course, it is quite intensive. This means that it requires systematic self-study and review. In order to complete the language lab requirement students will need to spend at least 1-¼ hours per week with the activities and tasks listed in Blackboard, in addition to the class assignments. The audiovisual language content is an integral part of



each chapter; the interactive language activities provide brief, manageable encounters with authentic language from the target cultures in German.

Additional goals and best learning practices:

- You will also be able to read, speak, and comprehend beginning German structures covered in the course outline.
- You will understand the critical role of listening in order to respond and communicate in both situational and functional contexts.
- You will practice and evaluate your own listening comprehension and oral skills through audio and computer-assisted technology in and out of the classroom.
- You will be challenged to transfer and apply your acquired language skills in dynamic activities individually, in groups or with the instructor.
- You are highly encouraged to approach your learning about German-speaking cultures with delight, enjoyment, curiosity, and an intercultural lens.
